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#### 1. Characterisation of the pilot site

The Czech pilot site is managed by the Institute of Archaeology of the Czech Academy of Sciences in Brno, the Visitors Center Mušov – Gateway to the Roman Empire. Different educational trails should lead the visitors to the roman sites. At the same place there was a fortified military camp, which was partially built over recently, but most of it is hidden under the surface, the area is used for agriculture. Some archaeological excavations provide information about the dating and a significant part comes from the time of the Macromannic Wars. Different construction stages can be evidenced by overlapping fortification lines and buildings. In recent times, in addition to rescue excavations, mainly geophysical investigations have been carried out.
